Don't Panic; The World Is Back in its Proper Orbit

By now, most of you know (and don't much care) that we're Roll, Tide folks at our house. We lived in Alabama for sixteen years, which is the longest time we have spent anywhere in our married life. Blake holds two degrees from Alabama. Kyle and his wife live in Birmingham, so we have lots of reasons to cheer for the Tide. Blake says that we were faithful through the Price, Shula, and Dubose years, so we earned the right to enjoy this current run.

But we are also Kentucky and Cubs fans. That means we don't usually have a lot to crow about except Alabama during the fall. Like all the Cubs fans, we start out with high hopes every April. In 2016, we celebrated Kyle and Maranda's wedding and the Cubs' winning the World Series all in the same week. That was something! "Maybe next year!" is usually the rallying cry of Cubs fans beginning about May or June when reality sets in. After 2016, we had some good runs and almost made it back to the Series a time or two, but fell short. This year has been up and down all season. All that talent, all that money, and we never seemed to get over the hump. Late last month, we found out what we had all pretty much figured out: we would not make the playoffs this year. Then came the news that our beloved manager, Joe Madden, would not return. Looks like things are getting back to normal.

Kentucky, as most of you know, has never been much of a football powerhouse. Since Bear Bryant figured out the pecking order and left Lexington for bigger things, our rallying cry in the fall has been, "Only a few more weeks till basketball!" But in recent years, we've found some new hope. Some big wins, like the one we finally got over Florida after losing to them more times than we like to remember. Some fairly respectable bowl games and wins. We began this season with more hope than usual. This might be the year, we thought, that we'd climb out of the middle of the pack. But then the quarterback went down, and his backup looks questionable. We're back at the bottom of the SEC East with Vandy, a spot both of us know well. Looks like things are getting back to normal. Fortunately, our spiritual life need not be like our sports loyalty life. Our well-being is not dependent on the performance of people with big contracts and inflated egos on the line. We need not experience the highs and lows that sports fans chew cases of antacids over. While we may experience mountain top spiritual experiences when worship inspires us or when grandchildren profess faith or when something else prompts a positive response from us, God's love for us is constant and is always available to us, even, maybe especially, when we need it most.

I'm not hopeful about seeing Kentucky in a New Year's Day Bowl this year. I'm still grieving over the Cubs not making the playoffs--again. But, spiritually, I'm in pretty good shape right now. And the next time I feel doubt or despair creeping up on me, I know the resources with which God has surrounded me that will prevent my falling in a hole I can't climb out of. Worship, prayer, scripture, the counsel of faithful people with whom God keeps me in community, good music, and things beyond my comprehension keep me on a level plain most of the time. My prayer is that those same resources are in your toolkit.



Stewardship 2020





September Session Report

- ❖ receipt of financial statements.

- ❖ approved participation in the Winter Soup Kitchen in partnership with First

- ❖ approved hosting a Thanksgiving Worship service including downtown churches (J. J. White, First Christian, Centenary United Methodist, Church of the Mediator Episcopal, and St. Al's Catholic) on Sunday, November 24. Offering will benefit MICA food pantry.
- ❖ approved designating our congregation a Matthew 25 Congregation in support of the denominational Matthew 25 initiative.
- ❖ called a congregational meeting for Sunday, October 13 to elect elders.
- ❖ set dates for Stewardship Season
- ❖ noted that the Rev. David Millican will preach here on December 29 while Bob and Deanna are away after the holidays.
- ❖ approved a concert here in the spring by the Meistersingers, a chamber choir in which Bob participates in Hattiesburg.
- ❖ approved study resources for adult Sunday School groups.
- ❖ noted the 90+ birthday party on September 29. Congregational Care and Fellowship will coordinate.
- ❖ moved the small balance in the Julian Brady Mission Travel fund into the Mission Budget to help defray expenses from this summer's mission trip.
- ❖ thanked those who came out for work day on the former Schroeder and Brumfield properties on August 31.
- ❖ began discussion of 2020 Church Budget
